## Course Description and Requisites

Psychology is the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. The content focuses on the exploration of major psychological theories and concepts, methods, and research findings in psychology. Topics include the biological bases of behavior, perception, cognition and consciousness, learning, memory, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapeutic approaches to treatment, and applied psychology.

## Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs)

**Program learning outcomes (PLOs)** are skills and knowledge that students will have achieved upon completion of the Psychology BA degree. Each course in our curriculum contributes to one or more of these PLOs. The PLOs for the Psychology BA degree are:

- 1. Knowledge Base of Psychology. Students will be able to demonstrate familiarity with the major concepts, theoretical perspectives, empirical findings, and historical trends in psychology.
- 2. Research Methods in Psychology. Students will be able to design, implement, and communicate basic research methods in psychology, including research design, data analysis, and interpretations.
- 3. Critical Thinking Skills. Students will be able to use critical and creative thinking, skeptical inquiry, and a scientific approach to address issues related to behavior and mental processes.
- 4. Applications of Psychology. Students will be able to apply psychological principles to individual, interpersonal, group, and societal issues.
  - Values in Psychology. Students will value empirical evidence, tolerate ambiguity, act ethically, and recognize their role and responsibility as a member of society.

#### GE Area D: Social Sciences

Area D courses increase students' understanding of human behavior and social interaction in the context of value systems, economic structures, political institutions, social groups, and natural environments. Students develop an understanding of problems and issues from different disciplinary perspectives and examine issues in their contemporary as well as historical settings and in a variety of cultural contexts.

The CSU requires students to complete General Education courses in the Social Sciences in at least two different disciplines. Students may meet this requirement by either 1) taking two lower-division Area D courses in different disciplines, or 2) taking two lower-division Area D courses in the same discipline and an Area S upper-division GE course in a different discipline.

#### GE Area D Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of an Area D course, students should be able to:

- 1. 1. demonstrate understanding of the ways in which social institutions, culture, and environment shape and are shaped by the behavior of individuals, both past and present;
- 2. 2. compare and contrast the dynamics of two or more social groups or social systems in a variety of historical and/or cultural contexts;
- 3. 3. place contemporary social developments in cultural, environmental, geographical, and/or historical contexts;
- 4. 4. draw on social/behavioral science information from various perspectives to formulate applications appropriate to historical and/or contemporary social issues.

**Writing Practice:** Students will write a minimum of 1500 words in a language and style appropriate to the discipline.

### Course Requirements and Assignments

#### **Grading Information**

Grading will be based on the following assignments:

#### Syllabus Quiz: 1 point

A short quiz on the syllabus is the first assignment. This is designed to make sure you are aware of its content as we start this course. You will have until **Monday, August 25th by 11:59 PM** to complete the quiz via Canvas. The quiz will be worth 1% of your final grade.

#### Canvas Discussion: 9 points (2.25x4)

There are a total of 4 canvas discussions across the course and each discussion post is worth three points. These discussions are meant to encourage critical thinking and apply the course content to "bigger picture" concepts. The due dates are posted on Canvas for each discussion post and below in

the course schedule.

Over the course of the term, you are required to submit responses to discussion board prompts, to submit your own questions, and to comment on your peers' questions. Therefore, you ought to do the readings in advance of the discussion board postings and come prepared to ask questions and share your thoughts about the materials.

These should be posted to CANVAS in response to questions/posting from me and/or your peers' questions/responses. The quality of your comments is more important than the length of your comments. Keep your remarks concise: no more than 150 words. These comments ought to reflect a thoughtful reading of the material in order to receive full credit. Failure to submit comments/questions on the discussion boards on time will negatively impact this portion of your grade (late comments/questions will not count).

#### Research Participation: (6 points)

#### Definition of a Credit Hour

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, *for each unit of credit*, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

Over the fifteen-week semester, students are expected to dedicate 135 hours to a three-unit course, inclusive of attending lectures, reading course materials, etc. In other words, students are expected to dedicate 9 hours a week to this course, inclusive of all course activities.

#### Department of Psychology Research Participation

An important part of the educational experience of Psyc 1 is not only learning about important facts and findings from scientific research in psychology but also serving as a participant in research in psychology. Broad exposure to a variety of research methodologies (experiments, correlational studies, lab studies, online studies, etc.) will provide experiential knowledge for students. This experience contributes to **Course Learning Objective 2**, as well aligning with **Program Learning Outcome 2** (Research Methods in Psychology).

Thus, it is mandated for Psyc 1 courses that each student obtain a certain number of hours as a participant in research studies in the department. Research participation will count towards your course grade.

There are several requirements by the department in order to receive full credit for research participation:

- 1) All students should complete at least one hour of their required research hours by October 1st.
- 2) Half of your research credit participation or 2 credit hours of your 4 hours must be in-person lab studies.

Lab studies are studies that require your physical attendance at an experiment held on campus, as opposed to online studies that include virtual participation in research.

Research participation will be treated as a course assignment worth 6% of the final course grade (i.e., 12 points). But to obtain the full 6%, you will need to complete 4 hours of research participation.

Anything less than 4 hours will result in less than 6%. (1.5% per hour):

- For students unable to participate in research studies due to age, lack of time, or missed appointments (see no-show policy), there is an option to complete an alternative assignment that will count towards your research requirement hours for the semester. Please see the distributed handouts on the alternative assignment for details on the requirements.
- All research hours and alternative assignments must be completed by **December 8**<sup>th</sup>.

Department of Psychology Policy for Awarding Research Hours for Partial Completion

For psychology students at SJSU, research participation is a requirement for completion of the Psyc 1 General Psychology course. However, it is the view of the department that **proportional credit** can be given in that points awarded should be commensurate with the effort expended by participants in studies.

Consistent with IRB ethical guidelines, participants can always elect to withdraw from a study for any reason. In these cases, credit will be granted in proportion to the amount of the study completed, with a minimum credit of 0.25 hours.

In cases where participants complete a study unreasonably quickly, credit will be granted in proportion to the amount of the study completed, with a minimum credit of 0.25 hours.

#### Exams: 60 points (4x15) CLOs 1-4

Four non-cumulative exams will be given during the semester. Exam dates are listed in the Course Schedule section. Exams are multiple choice, covering material from lectures and textbook chapters. Each exam will have several questions from lecture material that is not covered in the text, so it is important to come to class regularly (attendance counts).

Exams will be accessible via Canvas on the due date. A student can start the exam at any time during that time window; from the time that the student accesses the exam, they will have 90 minutes to complete it. Although the exam is open-book, the time limit will make it challenging to consult with notes, the textbook, and lectures for every question. Thus, students should study in advance and be very familiar with the material. Exams that are not submitted on time will receive a grade of 0.

Students are not permitted to consult with each other regarding exam questions; any indication that students have shared information about the exam, copied from one another, or engaged in any other form of academic dishonesty will result in a report to the Academic Judiciary

Final Exam: 24 points CLOs 1-4

The final exam for this course will be held Monday 12/15 10:45 AM -12:45 PM.

Final exams are governed by University Policy S06-4 (http://www.sjsu.edu/senate/docs/S06-4.pdf) which states that "There shall be an appropriate final examination or evaluation at the scheduled time in every course, unless specifically exempted by the college dean who has curricular responsibility for the course." Consistent with this policy, final exams will only be given at alternative times if (a) there are verifiable emergency circumstances or (b) if a student has more than two exams scheduled within a 24-hour period, in which case the student must contact the instructor at least three weeks before the last regular class meeting to schedule an alternative exam time.

There will be an in-person final exam worth 24 points. These will be similar in format to chapter exams, but about 1.5-2 times the length. The final exam will be cumulative, and it will assess your knowledge of core concepts and their real-world applications. Prior to the final exam, the instructor will specify which points on each study guide will be emphasized on the final exam.

Extra credit opportunities may be provided for students up to 4 grade points (~2 percentage points) of the total course grade.
